

Hurricane Facts

- Hurricanes produce strong winds, storm-surge floods and heavy rainfall.
- Hurricanes begin their life in warm, moist atmospheres, typically over tropical ocean waters near the equator. The warm, moist air rises above the ocean and forms clouds which rotate. If there's enough warm water to feed the storm, a hurricane forms.
- A tropical storm transitions to a hurricane once winds go above 74 MPH.
- Hurricanes rotate around a circle center called the eye, where it is generally calm with no clouds. Surrounding the eye is the eye wall the most dangerous part of the hurricane with the strongest winds, thickest clouds and heaviest rain! Do not go out in the eye when it's calm as you don't know when the other side of the eye wall will hit. The eye can be anywhere from 12-30 miles across.
- When a hurricane reaches land it often produces a storm surge. This is when high winds drive the sea toward the shore, causing water levels to rise and creating large crashing waves. Central Florida doesn't have too much of a concern, but residents need to be mindful of lakes, ponds and other bodies of water with rising water/flooding. A hurricane can produce 6 to 12+ inches of rain in a region.
- Hurricane Season is June 1 through November 30. Some years there are lots of storms, and some years there are only a few. It is best to prepare before June so you are ready.



Hurricane Lingo (some facts from weatherwizkids.com)

- There are five categories of hurricanes. This scale does not take into account other potentially deadly hazards such as storm surge, rainfall flooding, and tornadoes.
 - Category 1: 74-95 MPH winds
 - Category 2: 96-110 MPH winds
 - Category 3: 111-129 MPH winds
 - Category 4: 130-156 MPH winds
 - Category 5: 157+ MPH winds

TROPICAL STORM WATCH - Tropical Storm conditions with sustained winds from 39 -74 mph are possible in your area within the next 36 hours.

TROPICAL STORM WARNING - Tropical Storm conditions are expected within 24 hours.

HURRICANE WATCH - Hurricane conditions with sustained winds of 74 mph or greater are possible in your area within the next 36 hours. This WATCH should trigger your family's disaster plan, and protective measures should be initiated. Especially, those actions that require extra time such as securing a boat or other outside preparation.

HURRICANE WARNING - Hurricane conditions are expected in your area within 24 hours. Once this WARNING has been issued, your family should be in the process of completing protective actions and deciding the safest location to be during the storm.

Emergency Instructions for Kids

- 1. **Listen to authorities,** including local meteorologists.
- 2. **Prepare your home** by cleaning the yard of toys, bring large items inside or tie down items like outdoor furniture. These items can become projectiles during a storm.



- 3. **Bring your pets indoors**, if they are outdoor pets.
- 4. **Prepare a "grab bag"** in case you have to evacuate. The bag should include items for both you, your family and your pets. Bags should be packed in advance and include everything you will need while you are away from home (examples: medicines, canned foods, water, flashlights, books, pet food and fun toys).
- 5. **Call 911.** If you or anyone in your home is injured.
- 6. **Know your nearest shelter.** Ask your parents to find out where your nearest shelter is, and if you have a pet, know what shelters accept pets. Not all shelters accept pets.
- 7. **Know your evacuation route**, in case you are asked by local authorities to evacuate your home or shelter.
- 8. **Evacuate if asked to do so.** If you are instructed to evacuate by local authorities or if you feel unsafe.
- 9. **If evacuating, DO NOT drive or walk through high water.** Turn around, don't drown.
- 10. Stay indoors, if not evacuated. If you aren't advised to evacuate, or are unable to do so safely, stay indoors, away from windows, skylights and doors. Continue to monitor weather reports and don't go outside until the storm has passed. Downed trees, live electrical wires and other hazards can crop up unexpectedly.
- 11. **Keep routines.** If you and your family are asked to evacuate, keep your routine like a story before bedtime or a family meal each evening.
- 12. **Limit media time.** All kids can be disturbed by intense images online and on TV, so monitor your media intake.

Ways You Can Help Prepare!

The adults may be prepping the big stuff for the storm, but you can help as well!

Overall preparation

- 1. Help make an evacuation plan with your family.
- 2. Know your address and contact info of people you can reach out to if you need help in an emergency (police, fire, rescue, neighbors).
- 3. Help supply shop and organize supplies when you get home
- 4. Get several gallons of water before hurricane season
- 5. Get canned foods before hurricane season
- 6. Check all batteries and keep an inventory of what items need what size batteries.

Top 5 ways you can prepare your house:

- 1. Check and close/lock all windows and doors
- 2. Fill up tubs with water
- 3. Charge devices/phones
- 4. Bring in toys from outside
- 5. Fill containers with drinking water

Top five ways to prepare as you depart school:

- 1. Take your backpack and important schoolwork home
- 2. Take your computer/iPad home fully charged
- 3. Bring your lunch box home
- 4. Bring books to read for school and enjoyment
- 5. Take any valuable items home from school



Track the Hurricane

Watch the news for coordinates, or visit a weather website like the National Hurricane Center or weatherchannel.com. To plot each location of the storm over time, do the following:

- 1. Determine the latitude of the storm, the first coordinate in the pair, and locate it on the map (usually followed by an N or S). Latitude measures how far north or south a location is from the Equator (on a map, lines of latitude run east and west).
- 2. Determine the longitude, the second coordinate in the pair (usually followed by a W or E), and locate it on the map. Longitude measures how far east or west a location is from the Prime Meridian (on a map, lines of longitude run north and south).
- 3. Draw a $\mathbf 9$ (for a hurricane) or a $\mathbf 9$ (for a tropical storm) on the weather map.
- 4. Repeat steps 1 to 3 using the next tracked location of the storm.

How Do Hurricanes Gef Their Names?

The World Meterological Organization names them. For Atlantic Hurricanes, there is a list of male and female names which are used on a sixyear rotation.







Answer Key

• For those traditional answers....

Tropical cyclones/hurricanes are intense circular **STORMS** that originate over **WARM**, tropical oceans and have a maximum sustained **WIND** speed of **74** MPH with **HEAVY** rain.

A hurricane can dump 6 to 12 **INCHES** of **RAIN** across the region.

The eye is a region of mostly **CALM** weather at the

CENTER of a hurricane. The **EYE** of the storm is a circular area typically 12-30 **MILES** in diameter.
